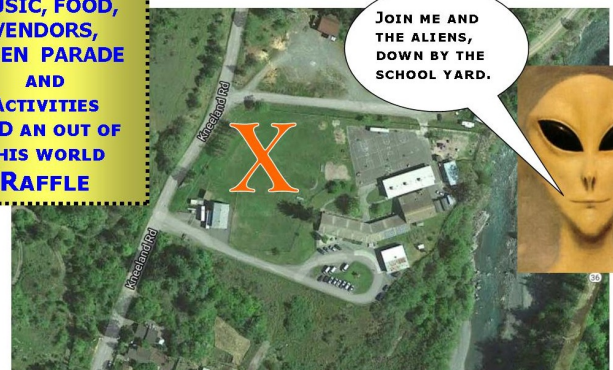

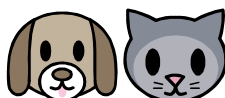

"Dear MFP" (Master Food Preserver)

It's that time of year that fruit is really coming on. What can I do with it all?

When faced with an overabundance of fruit, we look for ways to get variety into the pantry. Aside from canning, freezing, or dehydrating, there are numerous delicious spreads and confections. Sugar is a preservative as well as sweetener in these popular condiments.

Jelly: Made from cooking clear fruit juice with sugar, good jelly should be clear or translucent and firm enough to hold its shape when removed from its container.

Preserves: Made from small whole fruits such as berries, or larger fruits, such as peaches, cut in uniform pieces. The fruit should be plump and translucent and is suspended in a soft jelly.

Jam: A mixture of lightly softened crushed or chopped fruit and sugar, boiled until it is thick enough to spread. Firmer than preserves, but softer than jelly.

Marmalade: A soft fruit jelly containing small pieces of fruit or peel evenly suspended throughout. Usually containing citrus.

Conserve: Similar to jam, conserves contain a mixture of fruits. They may also contain nuts, raisins, or coconut.

Other fruit products also preserved by sugar, but not jellied:

Fruit butter: Made by cooking pureed fruit pulp until it becomes thick and spreadable. Spices are often added to fruit butters.

Fruit Sauce: Similar to applesauce, fruit sauce can also be made from pears, plums, or peaches. Fruit is cooked until soft, put through a food mill or sieve and sweetened or with added lemon juice as needed.

Curd: Made with citrus and eggs, Lemon or lime curd are tangy fruit spreads.

Chutney: A spiced fruit or fruit and vegetable relish. Chutneys also contain vinegar and are used on savory dishes.

'Honeys' & Syrups: Fruit or fruit juice and sugar is blended and cooked until it thickens, but not enough to hold its shape. They should be pourable.

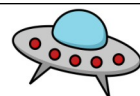
