"Dear MFP" (*Master Food Preserver*)

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) says bacteria including Clostridium perfringens can grow in cooked foods left at room temperature and that many outbreaks have been linked to foods commonly served during the holidays, such as turkey and roast beef.

DEH along with the CDC recommend following four simple steps to lessen the chance of foodborne illness: Clean, separate, cook and chill.

Clean your hands with warm, soapy water for at least 20 seconds before and after handling food. Thoroughly wash all surfaces, utensils and dishes with hot, soapy water and rinse with hot water before and after each use. Wash fruits and vegetables under cool, running water to prevent the spread of bacteria, even if you plan to peel them.

Separate raw and cooked foods to avoid cross contamination. Keep fruits and vegetables away from raw meat, poultry, eggs and seafood. Also, keep raw animal products separate from each other. Frozen turkeys and other meat should be thawed in the refrigerator, in a sink with cool water that is changed every 30 minutes or in the microwave.


Cook food to proper temperatures. Set the oven temperature no lower than 325 F, and be sure turkey and other meats are completely thawed before cooking. Using a food thermometer, make sure that the internal temperature of the turkey is at least 165 F at the thickest part, including the stuffing if it's cooked inside the bird. Cooking times will vary.

Chill turkey and other perishable foods in the refrigerator within two hours of being cooked, and do not eat leftover meat, stuffing or gravy that has been refrigerated for longer than three-to-four days.

All ideas for station locations will be brought before all members of the District and Department with impact studies directed toward locations that best suit our needs. Our District is striving to improve our response time with most of the effort empowering areas most in need.

It all started with Kate selling her Blue Lake house in 2005 and instead of taking all that money and depositing it into another house, she decided to save most for later, then use a little of it to help us travel a year to Alaska and beyond. Just a little. Enough to pay for part of the repair of Lyn's 1978 - 24 foot Americoach RV so the generator, heater and engine worked better, plus remodeling into a Hippy Heaven! This time we didn't have a lot of time to save, so got the money by delaying repair of one of our vehicles (which meant one less vehicle to drive for a while), plus didn't buy the sit-down mower we wanted at that time. So, there it was. And we were off for two weeks with them, Copenhagen and Amsterdam. Flaedelg bryllupsdag! (Danish for Happy Wedding Day!)

We have had more travels, and more ways to save for them. It all has taken creative thinking, some working time and plenty of dreams! We now live on those memories until the next time!

An obvious topic would be the annual winter holidays, Thanksgiving and the various winter religious and spiritual traditions. I wish a peaceful, joyous, and warm and dry Holiday Season to everyone! The Holiday spirit is for all to experience and enjoy and it is especially important for children. I was searching for something other than the typical Holiday column.

When I arrived at school that morning, I wrote a lengthy column about communication and coincidences. It just didn't feel right even though I thought it was well written and important. The next morning as I walked through the Bridgeville Community Center next door to the school office, I couldn't help but notice the food commodities stacked high throughout the room. At that point the topic for the School News became crystal clear.

Every month the Community Center offers food packs at their office and distributes them out Highway 36 to Dinsmore and over the Alderpoint road to Blocksburg. This program is supported by Food For People in Eureka, the Humboldt Area Foundation, and the Bridgeville Community Center itself. In the month of November, due to the Holiday Season, there are significantly more items available. Rice, carrots, onions, potatoes, sweet potatoes, apples, pears, oranges, bread, cereal, gravy mix, jam, vegetable oil, tomato sauce, tuna, canned fruit, canned vegetables, cranberry sauce, spaghetti sauce, spaghetti noodles, mac & cheese, powdered milk, peanut butter, and oatmeal were some but not all of the food items that jammed the Community Center that morning. In addition, turkeys are available in November and hams in December. If families don't have the ability to cook a turkey, gift cards are available to purchase a cooked turkey or ham. What an incredible service the Bridgeville Community Center does for our community. If this isn't the spirit of the season, I don't know what is. And what an undeniable reminder to us all what the Holiday season is really about. Peace, love, kindness, and generosity grace the season.
